

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## FOREWORD



# THE FINAL WORD

If you're in the 'mature' category (where I invariably find myself these days), you'll probably recall the dark days at the start of the 1970s, with power cuts and fuel rationing. An earlier generation than mine made a supreme effort (often resulting in the ultimate sacrifice) to win a War most did not want so future generations could have a better life.

I would never presume to be old enough or wise enough to counsel or advise, but perhaps consideration ought to be given to those at the very bottom of the class tier. There is a large sector of our Society in the UK classed as 'poor'. They fight and face extreme choices every day.
